PETS

Section 910

No more than 5 dogs, cats, or similar household pets are allowed per household (see Licensing below). All animals must be kept in a clean and sanitary environment where no odor can be detected off of the owner's property and no excessive noise disturbs the neighborhood. All pets are considered personal property and pet owners may be held liable for their pet's actions.

LICENSING

A private kennel license is required for properties that have any combination of 3 or more dogs and/or cats. A commercial kennel license is required if you raise, sell, breed, show, or groom any animal. All kennel licenses must be applied for annually and are available at City Hall.

All dogs over 6 months of age must be licensed and have a valid rabies vaccination. Dog licenses expire when vaccinations expire and need to be renewed. The Police Dept. assists with the licensing of your pet.



WASTE

Animal waste may contain diseased organisms that are transmittable to humans and other animals. For these reasons, pet owners are required to pick up after their animals and dispose of the waste in an appropriate refuse container. This pertains to the owner's property as well as all other private and public property.

LEASHING

All pets are required to be on a leash of less than 6 feet in length when off of the owner's property. When pets are outdoors on private property, they must be leashed or within a fenced yard. Pets that run loose can be lost, injured, or pose a threat to other animals and people.

NOISE

Although dogs may bark on occasion, owners must work with their pet to keep barking to a minimum. Pet owners must prevent their animals from becoming a nuisance to the community due to excessive barking, howling, or whining.

ANIMAL AND PET BITES

The Police Department must be notified anytime an animal bites or attacks a human or another animal. If the bite breaks the victim's skin, the pet must be quarantined at the P.U.P.S. Impound Facility, at the owner's expense. The pet will be quarantined for 10 days to ensure that the animal was not afflicted with rabies at the time of the bite.

WILD, EXOTIC AND NON-DOMESTICATED ANIMALS

Only traditional household pets are permitted in residential areas. Animals such as chickens, sheep, horses, ducks, and fowl are not allowed as pets in residential areas.

Wild, exotic, and non-domesticated animals such as monkeys, raccoons, and indigenous snakes are not permitted as pets in the City of Crystal. Such animals are not easily or typically domesticated and may be dangerous.
